The real-world practice, whether on a field or off, is rooted in a playbook. With a new instructional coaching model in place, the Shawnee Mission School District established a framework for instructional excellence known as the Instructional Playbook. The Playbook will highlight strategies that engage learners in content, both academically and socially. Instructional coaches serve as the bridge between school improvement plans, the playbook, and high-leverage classroom practices.

Participants will: (1) dive deep into the SAM-R framework for measuring technology integration; (2) discover ways to assess their own tech use in the classroom and to ensure they are engaging 21st Century students in relevant learning; and (3) focus on taking current practices and pushing the technology envelope to make the most effective use of their device.

Every teacher has heard the question, "Why do we have to learn this?" With this presentation, you can bring back an idea that no student will question. Inspired by Humans of New York, students learn through a collaborative community effort, by interviewing a member of their hometown and writing a focused profile story that can be published online or in the newspaper. Not only will this help hone students' writing of a topic using dialogue and a variety of narrative techniques, but it will also teach students that everyone has a story worth telling. This creates an empathy and real human connection that some students in this age of smartphones and Netflix are lacking. Help students take pride in their writing by giving them choice and publishing writing that will interest and benefit their community.

Session Description

Some Kansas Public School Districts have moved to using the ACT as a measurement of student achievement, while others are still considering its use. A Kansas Public School District wanted to understand the impact of student enrollment in AP courses on their ACT scores. Results of a study conducted in the school district to determine whether curricular path (AP or regular) makes a difference in how well students score on the ACT English, reading, math, and science subtests will be presented. Additional data related to whether there was a relationship between students' ACT composite scores and their GPAs will be included. Finally, the results of the data analysis related to whether the relationship between students' ACT composite scores and their GPAs was affected by the student demographic variables of gender, race, and SES affect results will be presented. The presentation will include an engaging activity around concerns and successes and a group discussion.

This session will provide participants with an interactive demonstration of the use of the College and Career Competency Framework (CCCF) in a Kansas MTSS system for secondary schools. The CCCF offers secondary schools embedded social emotional learning content that prepares students for all aspects and nuances of adult life. The embedded components of each competency of the CCCF align well with the Kansas MTSS framework as the CCCF components are taught in core academic environments to all students through the teacher's already developed core curricular lessons, which is a central focus of the Kansas MTSS framework. Examples of how the CCCF and Kansas MTSS can be implemented simultaneously in a secondary building will be presented. Additionally, the participants will have the opportunity to use select tools from each framework to develop hypothetical lessons for secondary school classrooms.
