Session Description

There is much buzz about "bystander engagement" in violence prevention circles, as it has become clear that the golden rule and reactive responses are not sufficient to prevent school violence. Prevention efforts must instead be proactive, fostering healthy school environments. Changing a school environment requires a community of proactive bystanders who take responsibility for making a difference. When caring for others and challenging harmful behaviors become the norm, incidence of violence is reduced. To be effective, these efforts must be comprehensive. Thus, it is important that not only students but also faculty, staff, and administrators possess strong bystander engagement skills. Participants will learn about the theory and evidence behind bystander approaches, discuss scenarios, and leave with tools for having conversations about this approach in their schools.

Session Description

In this session we will describe and demonstrate new tools designed to support Mathematics and English Language Arts teachers and students as they engage in formative assessment – an instructional process focused on gathering evidence of student understanding, interpreting that evidence to identify where students are in their learning, and determining next steps that will advance student achievement. The Center for Educational Testing and Evaluation has developed innovative instructional resources informed by learning map models, including Teacher Notes, Instructional Activities, Student Activities, and Solution Guides. These tools can assist teachers in delivering instruction that is sensitive to effective learning sequences outlined in learning map models and interpreting student work to identify and address learning needs. Participants will learn about and explore each type of resource and discuss how to implement them in their school settings.
