Major Components of ELC

- Community collaboration
- High-quality programs
- Comprehensive services
- Braided and blended funding from multiple sources
- Meaningful parent involvement
- Monitoring and accountability system





Benefits of Preschool Collaboration

- Shared resources, such as space, staff, expertise and professional development
- Alignment of standards, curriculum and best practices
- Natural peer environment
- Linkages to comprehensive services (e.g., health, mental health, social services)
- Increased family involvement
- Easier transition to kindergarten





Challenges

- Blending of different cultures (e.g., school district, Head Start, child care)
- Different program standards
- Cost allocations among different funding sources
- Staffing issues related to cost-sharing, credential requirements, etc.
- Time to invest in new collaborative relationships

Local education agency (LEA) includes each unified school district, special education cooperative, school district interlocal, state school, and school institution. Screening is a method for identifying children with a need for evaluation and is only required when there is a concern about a child. It is recommended that a child be screened within 30 calendar days of referral. Screening must be available in the areas of communication, cognitive development, social-emotional development, self help/adaptive behavior and physical development and include vision and hearing screening.	A range of services needs to be provided to support the education process such as nutrition, health and other services. Screenings are typically done the spring before children enter school/preschool.
